## Midsize Mainstay

2017 Toyota Camry XLE

Sliding inside this week's test drive car, my first impression was simple. "Gee, I can see!" Setting aside my penchant for profundity, the point is, Camry's visibility is very good.

It sounds basic, but it's actually quite rare. I drive over a hundred different vehicles a year. New ones, old ones, big and small ones. When it comes to visibility in current vehicles, I'm far more apt to be figuring out how bad it is, than applauding how good it is.



MSRP: \$23,070 (base LE), \$31,370 (XLE V-6) \$35,118 (as tested)

In Camry, big windows, thin roof pillars and the right seat height all contribute to the driver being able to see what's around all four corners. This promotes safer driving and returns blind spot and rear cross traffic alerts to their rightful, secondary role, in a belt-and-suspenders approach to driver awareness.

Sightlines aside, Camry's interior has room for five. Passenger griping, particularly on long trips, often comes from those in the back seats. Rear seat legroom is spacious — 38.9 inches — about 1½ inches more than traditional rival Accord, and the cabin is wide enough to accommodate three across in comfort.

Nothing here to complain about (unless it's your driving). Trunk space measures 15.4 cubic feet. That's about average for the segment, half a cubic foot shy of

stability more than sport.

value comfort and

perennial rival Accord, and is large enough to handle a typical family vacation's worth of stuff. The rear seatbacks split and fold to reveal a rounded pass-through, useful when you need to carry

useful when you need to carry long items. Up front, seating is long on comfort (even base models have a two-way power lumbar support for the driver), though lateral support is modest.

HVAC controls are conven-

tional in design, easy to use, non-distracting and located mid-way up the center stack. LE and SE trims get a 6.1-inch touchscreen for access to the Entune infotainment system. Screen size is bumped-up to 7 inches on XSE and XLE models (and optional on lower trim models via the Audio Plus Package). It's a fairly straight forward setup, though Camry (unlike Accord) doesn't

> allow for integration of smartphone apps like Android Auto or Apple CarPlay.

equipment. Also new for 2017 (and standard on XLE/SLE and XLE Hybrid) is wireless charging for your Qicompatible smartphone or MP3 player.
